## **European Anti-Corruption Report**

The European Commission published its first EU Anti-Corruption Report on 3 February 2014. By presenting an analysis of corruption within each of the EU's Member States, the steps taken to prevent and fight it, and possible ways of improvement, it aims to support the anti-corruption work in EU Member States, shore up political commitment to the fight against corruption, and identify how the European dimension can help.

The EU Anti-Corruption Report covers all 28 EU Member States. It consists of:

- A general chapter summarising the main findings, describing corruption-related trends across the EU, and analysing how Member States deal with corruption in public procurement.
- 28 Country chapters providing a snapshot of the situation on corruption, identifying issues that deserve further attention, and highlighting good practices which might inspire others.
- The Report also includes the results of two Eurobarometer surveys on the perception of corruption amongst European citizens on the one hand and companies on the other.

The Report is based on data from existing anti-corruption monitoring mechanisms (GRECO, OECD, UNCAC), as well as information from EU Member States' public authorities, civil society, independent experts and academic research. Information from the Commission's departments and from EU agencies in connected policy areas (e.g. public procurement, regional policy) were also used. Finally, indicators of perception of and experience with corruption (e.g. the Eurobarometer on corruption) were taken into account.

The next EU Anti-Corruption Report will be issued two years from now.

Around 250 participants attend each year, including a variety of representatives from countries such as the United States, Brazil, and Nigeria.
